- the Waterfall Garden Park near S Main. Some of us ladies were thrilled to stop at the Panama Hotel, a hotel that was featured in



the novel - Hotel at the Corner of Bitter and Sweet by Jamie Ford. During World War 2 many interned Japanese families who had lived in the Central District left belongings in the basement of the hotel and never returned to claim them. As we wandered back through the International District past several museums we took a few minutes to walk through Uwajimaya (the city's largest Asian market) with Yoko Melrose's guidance.

WALK AROUND LAKE UNION IN SEATTLE

On October 2nd, 2010 it so happened that I had to be in Seattle to attend some other business. That gave me and my friends (one from Portland Oregon and from Seattle) the opportunity to do the Lake Union YRE Walk.

I've done this walk many years ago. It was arranged by one of the Seattle Volkssport clubs. I was surprised that I could recognize only a few areas. There were no bike trails or walking trails at that time. It was interesting to see the tremendous amount of changes around the Lake Union.

The trail has also a new name: Cheslahud (pronounced CHES-la-hud), in honor to a Duwamish village chief, John Cheslahud, in the late 1800's who befriended Seattle pioneer

We departed Seattle as the sun was setting



for our train ride home. If you are a walker who has many challenge books, this is the walk for you. There are 19 challenges on this walk. Our advice to anyone who wants to go on this terrific walk is to plan to take the whole day to enjoy the delightful sights of downtown Seattle. The trail was officially opened on December 3, 2008. Most of the route is called "Cheslahud Loop" (CL).

After registering at the Fisheries Supply store, start and finish point, we were heading downhill to Northlake Way to Pacific Street and NE 40th Street passing "Peace Park and

Thousand Cranes sculpture". Peace Park was the dream of Dr. Floyd Schnoe, who after winning the Hiroshima Peace Prize in 1998 used the \$5,000 prize money to clear a small lot near the University of Washington. From a pile of wrecked garbage, cars, and brush, he

worked with community volunteers to build the beautiful Peace Park. It is currently the home of Sadako and the Thousand Cranes sculpture, created in 1990 by artist Daryl Smith. The statue is a life-size bronze of Sadako Sasaki, the young Japanese girl who survived the Hiroshima bombing only to die of radiation sickness at age of 12.

The walk leads to University Bridge. By following Fairview Avenue and quite a number of small alleys and side streets past a number of "street end parks", East Allison Street End Park, Louisa Street End Park, East Boston Street End Park and some more Street end Parks. Apparently the walk avoids most busy streets with these "street end parks", providing places to take a break at the lake shore. We passed a number of condos, shipyards and houseboats. It is worth mentioning that at these houseboats the movie "Sleepless in Seattle" was made here!

At the south end of the lake, South Lake Union Park, we stopped at Museum/center for Wooden Boats for checkpoint.

Lake Union Park is a unique urban gem,



close to the center of downtown Seattle. The park provides access to green space and

the water and celebrates the cultural, maritime, and industrial heritage of the city and region.



The site's role as a park became possible on July 1, 2000, when the US Navy conveyed the deed to its five acres of land to Seattle Parks and Recreation. The transfer consolidated...(Continued on Page 5)

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

the South Lake Union site into a 12-acre park. In partnership with the Seattle Parks Foundation, Seattle Parks and Recreation opened the new park on September 25, 2010.

At Lake Union Park, you can cross Waterway 3 on a pedestrian bridge. The change in this area is unbelievable! And there is an interesting quote from Internet "South Lake Union PI":

"Before park construction began, all that stood at the site was the deteriorating armory building and a vast, unkempt parking lot. No reminder existed of the beauty that was Lake Union before the Denny party arrived in 1851 or of what happened there after, when the idea of Seattle began to take root. It was there on the south shore that David Denny built the Western Mill and Thomas Mercer, after settling with his four daughters, proposed that the lake be given the English name "Union" because he hoped that all the city's waterways would one day meet and connect there. For better or for worse, this is where "meman harishu" or "tenas chuck" became Lake Union and modern Seattle was born."

After leaving Lake Union Park we fol-

lowed Westlake Ave. passina "street parks", yacht brokers, and houseboats. Ahead was Aurora Bridge. Going under the bridae was another interestina sight. Then we crossed Freemont bridge and on 34th

where we passed the sculpture of "Late for the Interurban", with JP Patches & Gertrude. beloved characters from a children's show.

ington icons J.P. Patches (Chris Wedes, pronounced WEE-dus) and his faithful sidekick Gertrude (Bob Newman) was dedicated on
